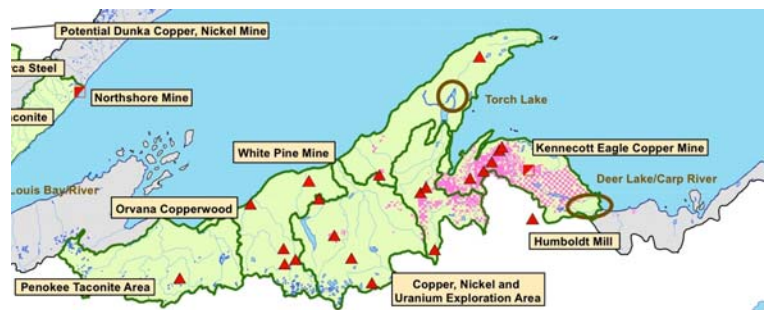

Dr. Power received his PhD in Economics from Princeton University. Dr. Power has been associated with the Economics Department at the University of Montana since 1968. He served as the Chair of the Economics Department from 1978 to 2008. In 2008 he retired from teaching and university administration, but remains active as a Research Professor. His teaching, research, and publications have focused on Natural Resource Economics and the intersection between natural resources and regional economic vitality and well-being.
